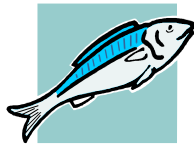

### Transitions

Greetings in Christ Jesus! I'm writing this, my first article for All Saints' newsletter, from "The Land of In Between." My family and I have said farewell to our former parish, with gratitude for the gifts of God that we were privileged to share with one another. Now we are eagerly looking forward to moving to Richland, settling in and beginning the next chapter in our lives with all of you.

But we are not there yet, by any stretch of the imagination! Right now, we are decidedly UNsettled. We are surrounded by boxes, bags, and piles of belongings to be sorted and packed, or given away, or disposed of. There is a clipboard full of lists and reminders of all manner of tasks to be done. And it seems as though I can't go 10 minutes without thinking of one more thing that **MUST NOT** be forgotten! Right now, so much of our energy is simply consumed with the work of shifting from one place to the other. It is a happy, exciting time; but also challenging, and more than a little stressful. As I told Lisa the other day, I'm looking forward to the time when the moving stops and the living begins.

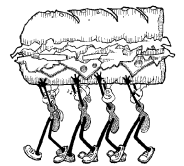

## Did You Know...?

---

Located just above the cornerstone of the church (which is in the Narthex, next to the elevator), there's another smaller stone, set in concrete. The plaque below it reads, "Hexham Abbey Stone. Cut in the twelfth century for Hexham Abbey, England, this stone reminds us of the ancient heritage of our church and was given to All Saints' by the Rt. Rev. Russell S. Hubbard who acquired it at the 1958 Lambeth Conference."

A little research reveals that there has been a church on the site of Hexham Abbey, located in central England, for over 1300 years. In 674, Etheldreda, Queen of Northumbria, made a grant of lands to Wilfrid, Bishop of York. Of Wilfrid's Benedictine abbey, which was constructed almost entirely of material salvaged from nearby Roman ruins, including Hadrian's Wall, only the Saxon crypt and the foundations of the apse still remain.

In the year 875, Halfdene the Dane ravaged the area and Hexham Church was plundered and burnt to the ground. About 1050, Eilaf, a treasurer for the Bishop of Durham, was put in charge of Hexham, and instructed to rebuild Hexham Church, which then lay in utter ruin. During the period 1170 to 1250, Wilfrid's abbey was replaced by an Augustinian priory. Most of the current church – the choir, north and south transepts, and the cloisters, where canons studied and meditated, – largely date from this period.

## The Journey Continues

What an incredible ten months we have had serving God together! I am thankful to the vestry for their call to serve as your Interim and deeply grateful to this community for the friendship and warmth extended to Ben and me as we settled in to live and work among you. It has been an amazing and grace filled time!

As our time together comes to an end, it delights me that in mid-September you will welcome my friend and colleague from Montana, Jane Schmoetzer, as your rector.

As we say farewell to you, we are preparing for the next chapter in our lives. As you know, shortly after we arrived at All Saints', our daughter gave birth to our granddaughter, Madeline Elise, whom we have seen only twice. First on the agenda is to visit Kim, Glen, and Madeline; they have invited us to be with them for the month of September during which we will have the opportunity to get more fully acquainted with Miss Madeline and have some precious family time with her parents. And, Ben will probably get to work on Kim and Glen's "honey do" list.

At the end of September we will return to our home in Montana and begin to unpack and integrate the things we have carried around the country with us for the past five years into our permanent home, which awaits our arrival.

Beginning October 1, I will be serving as rector of Calvary Church, Red Lodge, Montana. For over 100 years, Calvary has been part of a regional configuration of churches in south central Montana; in April Calvary was given permission by the Bishop to separate from the cluster and become a parish on its own. In the months that followed I entered into a discernment process with them which has resulted in my accepting a call to serve God as their rector. Red Lodge is a year round resort community of 4500 people about an hour from Billings, so we will be able to live in our own home again.

We have truly come full circle, as the first interim position that I held was in the Yellowstone Episcopal Ministries, the cluster of churches of which Calvary was a part. I served as their Interim for two years before accepting a call to Jefferson City, Missouri. While it is "going home" in many ways, it is also a "new creation" and the transition

continues. Transition and discernment shape us. The God who created us in God's image has given us everything we need to live fully and faithfully.

You will be in my prayers in the days ahead as you welcome Jane and Bruce and Kyle. We are deeply thankful for our short stay in the Tri-Cities; you have left footprints on our hearts!
